



## APORS High Risk Infant Follow-Up Program

### What is the purpose of APORS?

The state of Illinois requires that all newborns who leave the hospital with certain high risk conditions called 'adverse pregnancy outcomes' have access to follow-up home visits by a public health nurse within 14 days after discharge from the hospital, up to age 2. This program is called the Adverse Pregnancy Outcomes Reporting System (APORS). APORS collects information that will help guide public health policy to reduce adverse pregnancy outcomes and provide special services to correct and prevent further health problems.

### How can a public health nurse help?

The public health nurse can support the family, by providing guidance on:

- breastfeeding support
- infant care
- optimal growth and development
- how to prevent complications and illness
- ways to reduce family stress
- referrals for evaluation, treatment and supportive services

### What kind of conditions are considered high risk?

In order to be referred through the APORS system, the infant must have one of the following conditions at birth:

- Prematurity (less than 30 weeks)
- Birth defect
- Multiple births (3 or more)
- Serious infection
- Metabolic, endocrine, or immune disorder
- Blood disorder
- Neonatal or fetal death
- Prenatal drug exposure
- Other high risk conditions
