

There are medications that can be given to people at high risk of severe illness, to help prevent hospitalization or even death. Treatment works best when given early.

If you test positive for COVID-19 and have one or more <u>health conditions</u> that increase your risk of becoming very sick, treatment may be available. Contact a health professional right away after a positive test to determine if you may be eligible, even if your symptoms are mild right now. Don't delay. Treatment must be started within the first few days to be effective.

If you don't have a healthcare provider, contact your health insurance company to find one. If you don't have health insurance, visit a federally qualified health center (FQHC) or free clinic.
