



Respiratory Illnesses



Snapshot

- Flu activity this season has been the highest in many years.
- Respiratory season seems to have peaked.
 - This means we will still have these higher levels of respiratory activity for several more weeks.
- Respiratory hygiene must be supported:
 - Posters, reminders, etc.
 - Hand sanitizer stations, adequate hand-washing supplies, etc.
- Take steps for cleaner air:
 - Filters, higher air turnover
- Support time off for individuals to stay home when sick or to seek treatment.
- It's not too late to get vaccinated!



COVID-19

Low and Steady


- ICU admissions are low, primarily occur in older adults.
- ER visits, hospital admissions, and wastewater detections have remained relatively low and stable.



Influenza

High


- ER visits are above last season and the last big pre-pandemic season (2017-18).
- Hospitalizations and ICU admissions are nearly double levels from the previous season. Activity is high and stable, but wastewater detections are still increasing.
- Of the Flu A specimens subtyped, ~62% have been pandemic H1N1, ~38% have been H3N2. Flu B is starting to rise.



RSV

Downgraded to Low and Stable


- Peak activity was slightly higher than the 2022-23 season, when RSV first started popping up more often.
- ER visits, hospitalizations on the decline.
- Vast majority of ICU admissions occur among children ages 0-4 years.



Other Respiratory Concerns

Mycoplasma

 Lab testing data shows this season's pneumonia-du-jour peaked at the beginning of winter and has since been decreasing.



Others

- Human metapneumovirus, enterovirus/rhinovirus lab testing data indicates low levels.
- However, lab data also shows that these viruses tend to increase in the spring.


Percent Positivity for Human Metapneumovirus 7 % Positive 2 Cook County of

Norovirus

- Lab data backs up anecdotal and outbreak evidence of an unusually bad season this year.
 - The peak is nearly double the peak of previous seasons'.
- Activity is still high.
 - The percent of specimens testing positive decreased from December to January, but increased again in February.





Reminder: alcohol alone can't kill norovirus! Need actual handwashing and bleach solutions for cleaning surfaces!

Tobacco Use and Exposure Health Disparities

While overall tobacco use is declining, it remains the largest preventable cause of disease, disability, and death in the U.S. and significant disparities persist



- Tobacco use is the number one cause of preventable death among Black Americans.
- 45,000 deaths among Blacks every year.
- Widening disparities and lower quit ratios across all age groups.
- Secondhand smoke causes approximately 7,330
 deaths from lung cancer and 33,950 deaths from heart disease each year.

85% of Black smokers smoke menthol cigarettes compared to **29%** of White smokers.

Secondhand smoke causes the **premature** death of 41,000 adults and more than 400 infants each year.

Tobacco Use and Exposure Disparities (continued)

While overall tobacco use is declining, it remains the largest preventable cause of disease, disability, and death in the U.S. and significant disparities persist



- 2.1 million youth and young adults report
 using e-cigarettes and more that 1 in 4
 reported daily use
- Individuals with behavioral health conditions account for nearly 50% of all tobacco-related deaths each year

Middle and high schoolers who reported current e-cigarette use, **89.4% used flavored products**.

Nearly 25% of adults have a mental health or substance use condition. These adults consume almost 40% of all cigarettes smoked by adults.




- More than 60 different chemicals

- Flavorings







