
CCDPH – Nursing

- Vision and Hearing Screening Program
 - As of September 2024, CCDPH has restarted the screening program for hearing and vision of preschool children ages 3-5 years old. The application is available on CCDPH's website at <u>Vision and Hearing Screening Cook County Department of Public Health</u>.
 - All screenings are conducted by a certified technician that has been trained by the Illinois Department of Public Health.
 - Our program conducts comprehensive vision and hearing screening for preschool children ages 3-5 years old within the suburban communities of Cook County in all public, private and parochial schools.
 - Screening services include the identification, testing, evaluation, and follow up services
 - o Provide necessary referral services based on the evaluation results
 - Our goal for the upcoming FY 2025-2026 is to included the school age children grades kindergarten, first, second and eighth grades for hearing and vision screenings.

Illinois Breakfast After the Bell Grant opportunity + Child nutrition contract role w/ ISBE

GRANT OPPORTUNITY: The Illinois State Board of Education is seeking grant applications for the Breakfast After the Bell Program.

This program is open to public schools in Illinois. Eligible entities are school districts, charter schools, and Regional Offices of Education.

In addition, an entity must be eligible and approved to operate the federal School Nutrition Programs. Grant awards are up to \$7,000 per each eligible school.

Pertussis: Whopping Cough


- **❖** Bacterial Infection
 - ➤ Coughing Fits
- Very Contagious
- Spread by Respiratory Droplets

Outbreak Definition


An outbreak is five or more cases clustered in time (within 42 days of each other) that are epidemiologically linked (non-household).

- **❖** Vaccination
 - ➤ Childhood vaccinations
 - ➤ Adults require a booster dose every 10 years
- Handwashing
- Masking
- Postexposure antimicrobial prophylaxis





Pneumonia Among School-Aged Children



Mycoplasma Pneumonia

Transmission

M. pneumonia is spread through respiratory droplets from coughing and sneezing. Other people can get infected if they breathe in those droplets

Prevention



There is no vaccine to prevent infection with M. pneumonia. Hand washing and covering coughs and sneezes



Practicing good respiratory hygiene is a core prevention strategy to lower the risk of M. pneumonia and other respiratory illnesses

Updated Instructions to Request Prescription and Standing Order

- ❖ Complete the <u>online School Request Undesignated Medication Prescription and Standing Order form</u> on CCDPH website.
- ❖ The school nurse will need to complete this request. Please complete one form for each school within the district. Schools can save a copy of the request form submitted. An autogenerated email will be provided following submission and CCDPH will follow-up within 7 business days.
- All request forms must be completed for **each** medication requested (you will NOT be able to select both epinephrine and asthma medication on the same form).
- Schools will need to identify and document at least two employees, in addition to the school nurse that have been trained to correctly administer the undesignated medication. Only trained personnel should administer medication. Training must be renewed annually, certified by the school nurse or a physician.

Illinois Youth Tobacco Survey (ILYTS)



Overview

- The ILYTS gathers data about the trends and nuances of youth tobacco use at the county and state levels.
- The information collected helps shape public health policies and programs aimed at reducing tobacco use and improving the health of young people across the counties and state.
- Conducted every other year; 150 schools throughout the state of Illinois have been randomly selected to participate in the 2024 fall survey. Another 150 schools have been selected to participate in the survey during spring 2025.



Illinois' Commitment to Early Childhood Education: Expanding Access and Equity for Families

- Illinois' Goal: To become the best state for families raising young children by improving childcare and early learning programs.
- Early Childhood Funding Commission: Established in 2019 to study and recommend equitable funding strategies for Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) services.
- Equitable Access for All: Recommendations aim to ensure all Illinois families, regardless of race, language, ability, or social circumstances, have access to high-quality early childhood services.

What is Birth to Five Illinois?

- Birth to Five Illinois was created to help bridge the gaps between families, caregivers, Early Childhood providers, and decision-makers.
- We rely on quantitative data collected from state, local, and private agencies and organizations and qualitative data collected from families, caregivers, providers, and stakeholders to form recommendations that will make ECEC services and supports more equitable for all children and families in the State
- Birth to Five Illinois was founded in September 2021, and work began with opening Regional offices in Summer of 2022

Mission

To create a statewide regional infrastructure that will amplify input from communities in the development of policies and funding priorities. We support the mobilization of communities to build and sustain equitable access to inclusive, high-quality early childhood services for all children and families in the state of Illinois.

Birth to Five Illinois' takes a Regional approach to prioritize family voice in determining regional needs.


Year 3 Scope of Work

Mental & Behavioral Health

Why focus on Mental & Behavioral Health?

Mental and Behavioral Health was a prominent and reoccurring need identified in our needs assessments across all 39 Regions. The feedback received throughout the State, along with the announcement of the Illinois Governor's Smart Start initiative and the State's focus on children's Mental Health, solidified our goal to understand these issues at the community level better.

Early Childhood Mental & Behavioral Health Regional Landscape

- Regional teams and council members discussed the overall mental and behavioral health landscape to understand better what is available to families and ECEC professionals in the region. Conversations focused on who can access services and what the referral process looks like for families.
- While services for young children may be available in the Region, not all families can access them.
 Most providers are in the eastern Region; some services are available virtually. However, families would need the technology and understanding of how to use it to access services.
- 61% of the people surveyed across the State said they waited two or more months to gain services after receiving a referral. 11% said they were never able to get services for their child.
 37% of those surveyed said they traveled an average of 30 or more minutes for services.
- Most Regional referrals come from a pediatrician, Early Intervention or Child's School



Parent & Caregiver Experiences

 "Eventually, we located a single doctor in a different Region who could conduct the evaluation. However, this practitioner gave me an evaluation [the parent] to administer to my child, resulting in a considerable waste of time. To find a suitable provider, we had to switch insurance companies. It took a year before we could finally access the necessary support for our child" -Community Member

Infant/Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation (I/ECMHC)

- I/ECMH Consultants provide training and support for the Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) professionals who work directly with young children.
- I/ECMH programs do not provide direct Mental or Behavioral Health services. Instead, they support parent-child relationships by facilitating group connections, encouraging healthy growth and development, and promoting safety and family well-being.
- I/ECMH services are not readily available in Burnham, Country Club Hills, Ford Heights, Palos Heights and Phoenix. These communities are primarily served by license-exempt childcare providers and Family, Friend and Neighbor childcare.
- Council and community members also shared that staffing shortages, lack of funding, and lack of awareness are also reasons that some ECEC programs do not use I/ECMHC



Parent & Caregiver Experiences

- "As providers, we do not have the same resources as the CBOs [Community-Based Organizations] or school districts." – Family Child Care Provider
- "I was not aware that I/ECMH Consultants were available for providers." – Family Child Care Provider

Home Visiting

- There are several home-visiting programs in Illinois that support expectant families and caregivers with newborn babies.
- These programs aim to support people who may experience conditions that can lead to harmful health, educational, and social outcomes.
- While services for young children may be available in the Region, not all families can
 access them. and some services are available virtually, but families must have the
 technology and understanding of how to use it to access services online.
- There are some Prevention Initiative program sites in Region 1-B-C that offer Home Visiting, yet the actual number of Home Visitors working in the Region is not known.
- Baby Talk, a family engagement model, provides a framework for some home visitors within the Region.
- There is a significant uptick in Individualized Family Service Plans in the State and the Region. Many Regional service coordinators have a caseload of 80-100 cases.

Parent & Caregiver Experiences

 "Home Visiting services made a significant difference for my child, especially considering that his first two years coincided with the COVID-19 pandemic. Without Home Visiting, he would have limited socialization opportunities outside our family circle." – Community Member

Regional Needs

- Improved access to Mental & Behavioral Health Services, particularly for underserved populations and non-English speaking families.
- Culturally competent services and resources sensitive to families' diverse backgrounds and needs, including more bilingual staff to support families who speak languages besides English.
- Services that meet the needs of families based on their locations, with insurance plans accepted and appointment times available during non-traditional hours.
- More training opportunities for leadership and support staff to enhance their capacity to address Mental & Behavioral Health challenges.
- 5. Mental & Behavioral Health services that are integrated into other social services to provide holistic support for families and children.



Key Takeaways

- Advocacy is crucial in advancing Mental and Behavioral Health priorities and securing resources for Mental Health Services.
- Barriers to accessing Mental and Behavioral Health services, such as stigma, lack of awareness, and financial constraints, must be addressed to ensure equitable access for all families.
