



- 24/7/365 rapid response to assess anyone within the community in need of mental health crisis treatment, regardless of payor status
- · Offers community-based interventions and stabilization where the individual is located
- Determines at the time of crisis what level of care is most appropriate to keep the individual/community safe
- Access to ongoing case management, therapeutic interventions, psychiatric care and medication monitoring



Who can use Mobile Crisis Response?

- Children age 5 and older, adolescents, and adults at home, school, work, or hospital, we come to you.
- Police, firefighters, medical professionals, educators, clergy, and community members can make emergency calls or routine referrals.

Range of Services

We connect you to immediate access to mental health therapy, addiction treatment, urgent care, case management (supportive housing and employment services, transportation, food assistance) and after crisis contact for up to 8 weeks.

Communicable Disease Unit

Vaccine Preventable Diseases + School Setting

- The CCDPH Communicable Disease (CD) Unit provides individualized consultation in school settings to control, prevent, and manage outbreaks
- CD staff investigates reports of infectious diseases, gathers information, conducts key interviews, and arranges testing when necessary
- Prevention and control guidance on exclusion (quarantine/isolation), environmental cleaning and disinfection is tailored for each site and each outbreak
- CD staff ensures accurate, fact-based communication between parties—for example providing a template letter for schools to send to parents
- Monitoring of cases or clusters continues, and guidance is provided, until it is safe to resume normal operations

Farm to School Efforts at Proviso Township High Schools

Building Stronger Menus, Communities, and Connections

Why Farm to School?

Supports and strengthens local farmers & regional food systems

• Builds long-term farmer–school partnerships that supports food supply chains

Provides fresher, higher-quality ingredients for students

- Shorter supply chain means better taste and nutrition
- Seasonal produce brings variety to menus

Boosts student interest and participation in school meals

- Students are more likely to try familiar, fresh foods
- New, innovative recipes increase excitement in the cafeteria

Creates hands-on learning opportunities in food, nutrition, and agriculture

- Connects classroom lessons to real-life food systems
- Sparks curiosity about where food comes from and how it's grown

Proviso Township HS Farm to School Journey....so far



- Gradual rollout of pilots
 - Start small, test new recipes for student input
 - Build confidence before district-wide adoption
- Collaboration with regional food partners
 - The Common Market has been great with the initial roll out of farm to school products
- Balanced taste, nutrition & culture
 - Incorporate student-preferred flavors while meeting USDA nutrition standards
- Goal → increase menu consumption
 - Reduce food waste and improve participation rates

Beef & Black Bean Patty Pilot

- Partners: The Common Market + McCann Meats
 - Collaborating with partners helps understand the ins and outs of local supply chains
- Locally sourced beef & black beans product
 - Supports local producers and strengthens regional food systems
 - Reduces environmental impact from long-distance transportation
- Piloted in 2024 → positive student response
 - Students enjoyed the taste, which led to increased meal participation
- Healthier, cost-effective option
 - Aligns with wellness goals and encourages healthy eating habits





Expanding with Local Grains

- Support from Artisan Grain Collaborative
 - Collaboration with a regional organization dedicated to high-quality, sustainable grains
 - Strengthens relationships with local producers and food artisans
- Adds menu variety & cultural relevance
 - Introduces new textures, flavors, and grain types to the menu
 - Allows meals to reflect regional and cultural food traditions
 - Engages students with diverse, appealing, and nutrient-rich options

Food Advocacy & Community Impact

- Advocacy beyond food
 - Farm to School programs go beyond meals to teach students about where food comes from
 - Encourages engagement in local food policy and community initiatives
- Builds school–farmer–family connections
 - Creates opportunities for students and families to meet and learn from local farmers
 - Strengthens relationships between schools, local agriculture, and communities
- Promotes equity in food access
 - Ensures all students, regardless of background, can access fresh, nutritious, locally sourced meals
 - Helps address disparities in healthy food availability
- Inspires food system awareness
 - Empowers students to make informed food choices and become future advocates



Looking Ahead



- Pilot new local items
 - Introduce additional locally sourced ingredients and recipes
 - Test new menu options with students to gauge taste, acceptance, and participation
 - Refine recipes based on feedback for long-term adoption
- Share success stories
 - Highlight student engagement, positive feedback, and increased participation
 - Use storytelling to inspire other schools and community members
 - Demonstrate measurable impact on nutrition, sustainability, and local sourcing
- Vision → cornerstone of wellness & innovation
 - Integrate hands-on food education and sustainability into school culture
 - Foster a long-term vision where local foods and wellness are central to every meal



ISBE | Local Food for Schools (Ends January 2026)

Program Details:

- USDA Cooperative Agreement
- · 7.3 million dollars allocated to Illinois in 2022
- Non-competitive sub-awards
- Distributed to IL SFAs to purchase local fresh/minimally processed food from IL or 400 miles from delivery site
 - Fruits, vegetables (fresh or pre-cut), grain products, dairy foods,meat/poultry
- Prioritize purchasing from underserved producers/growers
- School Food Programs reimbursed : lunch (NSLP),
 breakfast (SBP), After School Snack Program and/or the
 Seamless Summer Option (SSO)
- Only for food purchasing, no admin dollars

ISBE | School Breakfast Program (SBP) Expansion Grant

Program Details:

- Voluntary program: SBP is part of National School Lunch Program (NLSP)
- Focus is establish, maintain or expand SBP in the SFA's qualifying schools.
- Sub-granting up to 10K per qualifying school/ group of schools
- Award range between \$500 \$10k per recipient
 - Total for FY26 \$993K
 - Annual disbursement, usually close by May
 - Cost sharing not required
