Our Current Immigration Process (Most Basic Explanation Possible)

- Step 1- Green Card (LPR- Lawful Permanent Residence)
- Step 2- U.S Citizenship

How to get a GREEN Card?

- Family Based Immigration
 - Marriage
 - Your US Citizen Child over the age of 21 can petition for you
- Employment Based Immigration
- Visas!

◦ There are more than 20 nonimmigrant visa types for people traveling to the United States temporarily. There are many more types of immigrant visas for those coming to live permanently in the United States. The type of Visa you need is determined by the purpose of your intended travel. For an overview of visa types, please see Types of Visas for Temporary Visitors or Visa Types for Immigrants.

◦ VAWA- Violence Against Women Act (Spouse, Parent, Child)

◦ U-VISA- Victim of a crime in the US, must cooperate with authorities, suffer emotional/physical harm. (Must have a police report.) (Under attack)

What about a work permit?

- Does not mean you have immigration status.
- You **COULD** be eligible for a work permit while your application is pending.
- Asylum Applicants- eligible after 6 months.
- U-Visa- eligible after 3 years.

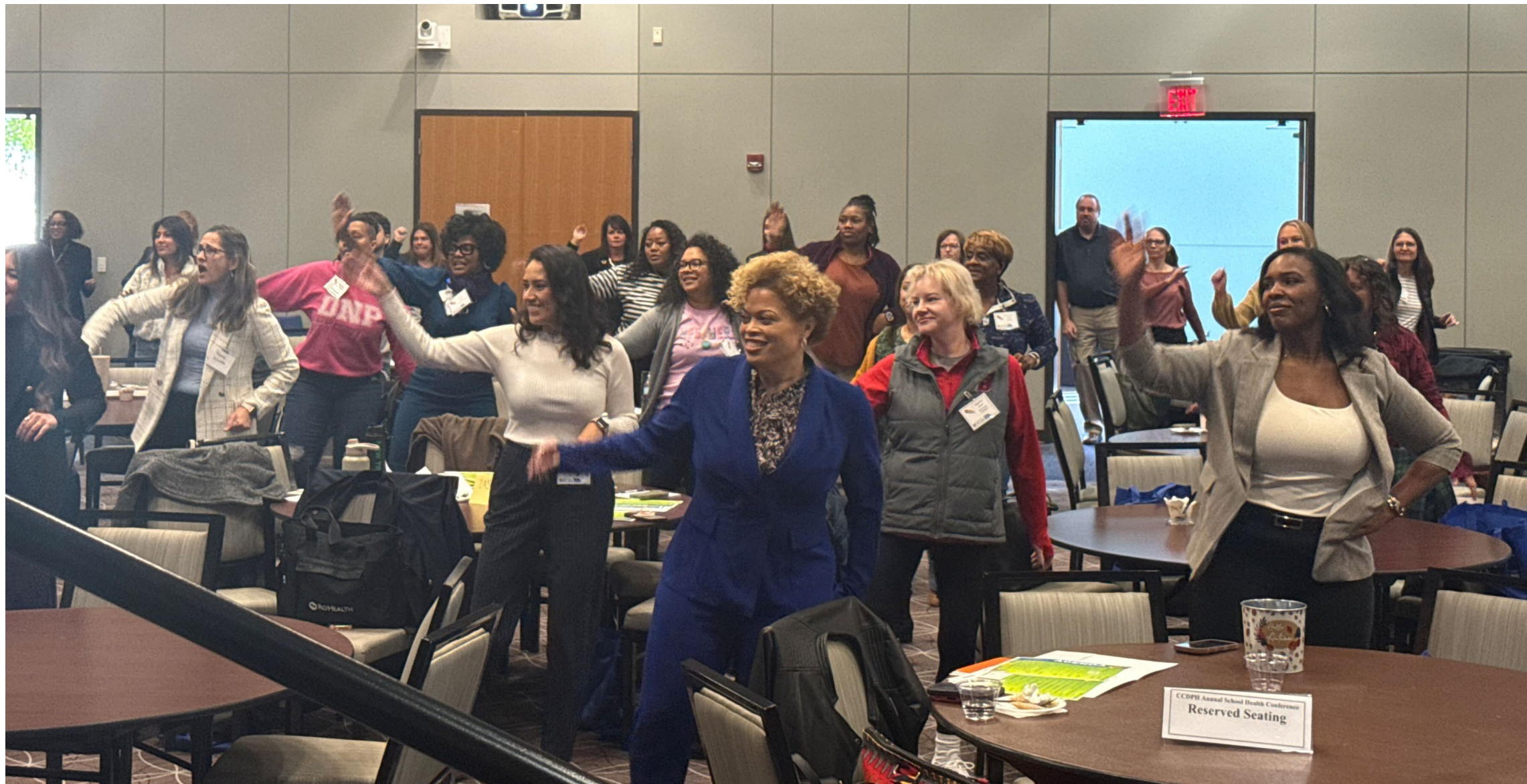

CCDPH –Free Flu and Covid Vaccination Clinics

Cook County Department of Public Health, in conjunction with Cook County Health and CountyCare, is offering free flu and COVID-19 shots at its Saturday vaccination clinics, located in five suburban Cook County locations.

Children (6 months and up) and adults can receive flu and COVID-19 vaccines at no cost, regardless of insurance coverage, at the Saturday walk-in clinics. The clinics are open on certain Saturdays from Oct. 18 through March 28, 2026, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., at five different locations in suburban Cook County. A person's immigration status will not stop them from receiving immunizations. More details about the clinics are below:

- Walk-ins welcome, no appointment necessary
- Resource coordination and referrals available
- Bring a form of I.D. and insurance card (**Note: insurance is not required**)

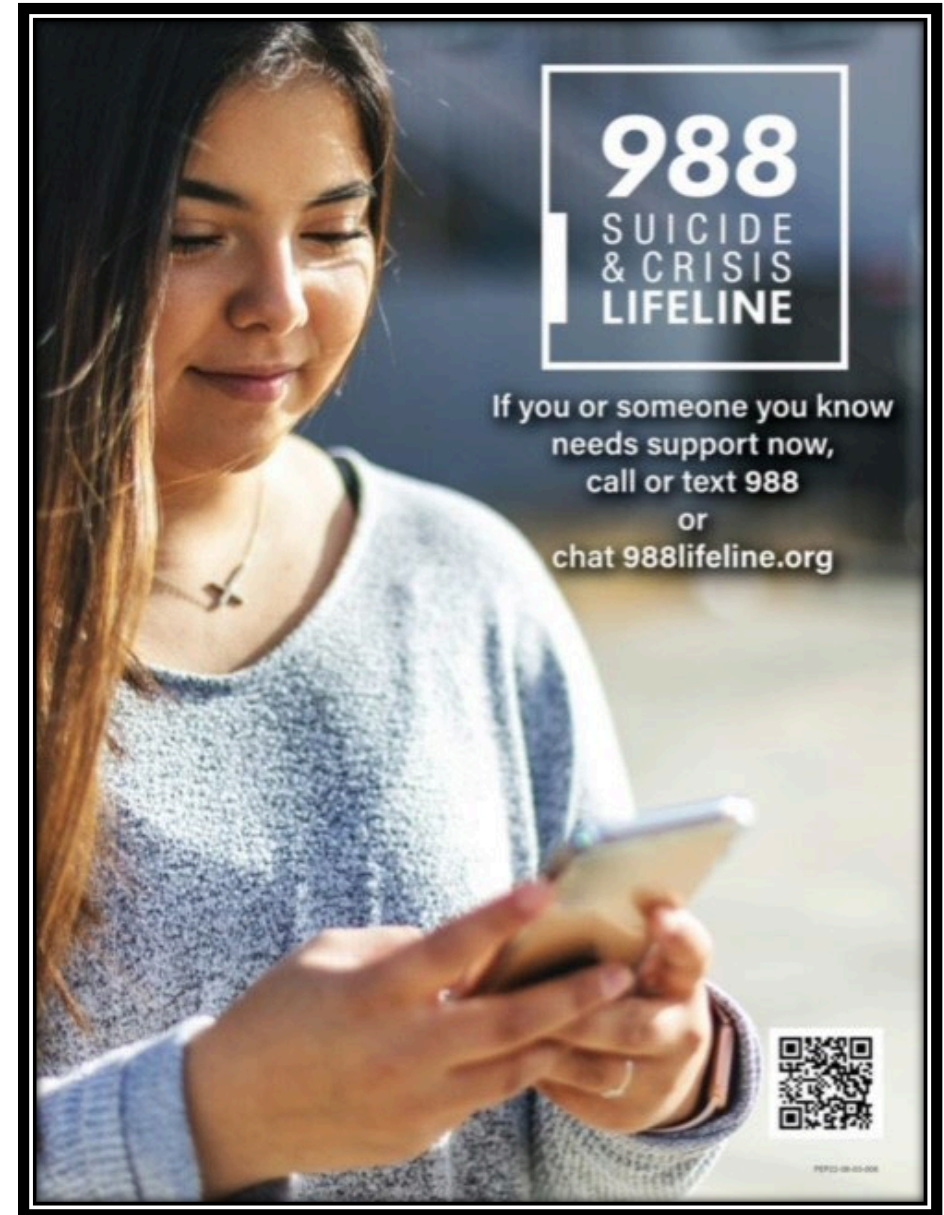

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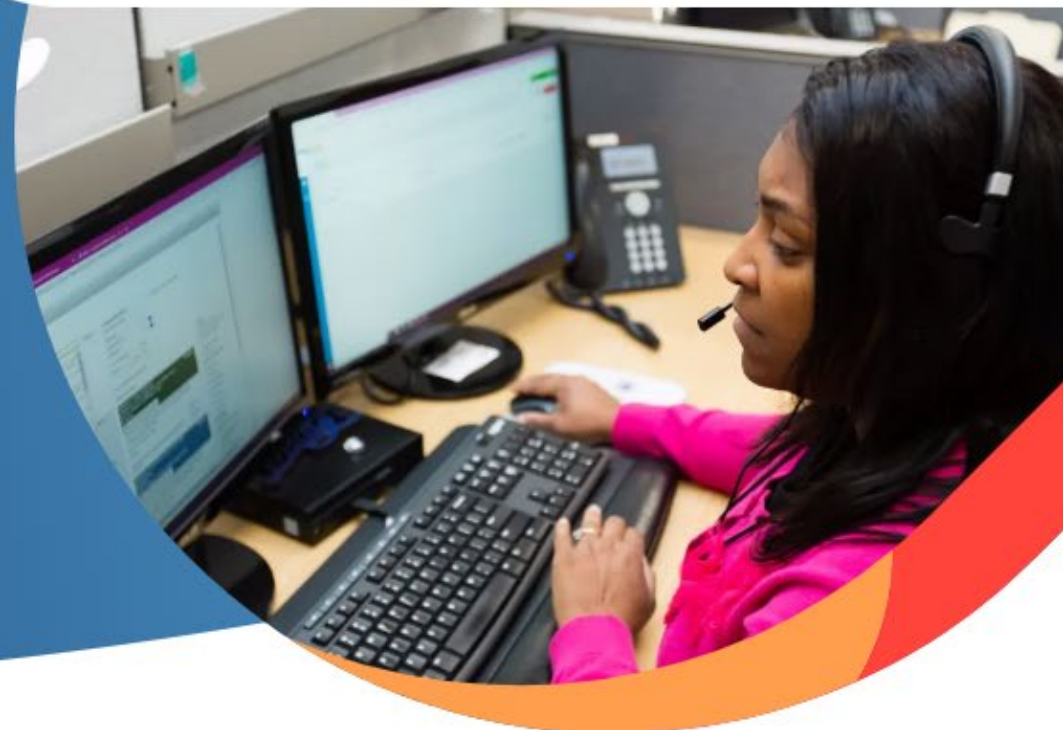

Program 590 Mobile Crisis Response provides:

- 24/7/365 rapid response to assess anyone within the community in need of mental health crisis treatment, regardless of payor status
- Offers community-based interventions and stabilization where the individual is located
- Determines at the time of crisis what level of care is most appropriate to keep the individual/community safe
- Access to ongoing case management, therapeutic interventions, psychiatric care and medication monitoring

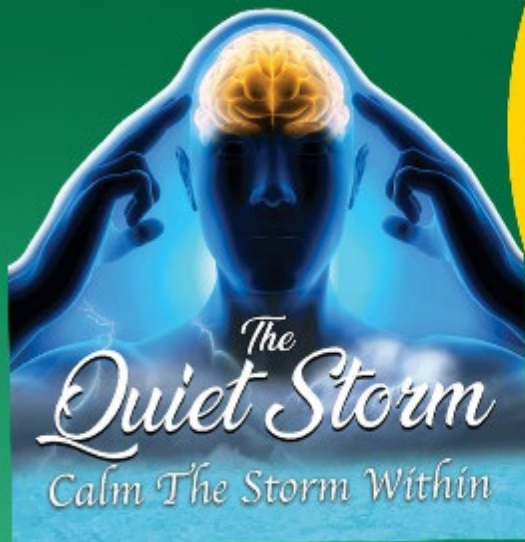

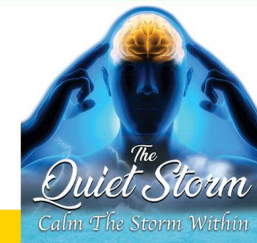

Rapid Response

- Trained mental health Mobile Crisis Specialists arrive within 60 minutes to provide crisis stabilization, intervention services, a safety plan, and clinical recommendations.
- Dispatch is available in the far south side and south suburbs.

Who can use Mobile Crisis Response?

- Children age 5 and older, adolescents, and adults at home, school, work, or hospital, we come to you.
- Police, firefighters, medical professionals, educators, clergy, and community members can make emergency calls or routine referrals.

Range of Services

We connect you to immediate access to mental health therapy, addiction treatment, urgent care, case management (supportive housing and employment services, transportation, food assistance) and after crisis contact for up to 8 weeks.



What's a Crisis?

Anyone experiencing a non-life-threatening mental health crisis.

- Loss of Self Control
- Cyberbullying
- Domestic Violence
- Extreme Anxiety or Depression
- Aggression towards self/others
- Suicidal Ideations or Attempts



Key Points

COVID-19, Influenza, RSV

- Flu activity has been elevated from minimal to low. RSV activity is low and COVID-19 activity is minimal.
- Emergency room visits associated with RSV are continuing to increase, especially in children under 5.
- The first ICU admission associated with RSV for the 2025-26 season was reported this week. ICU admissions associated with COVID-19 continue to be reported weekly, primarily in those over 65.
- Wastewater detections for all monitored pathogens remain low.

Is anything else going around?

- Test positivity for [rhinovirus/enterovirus](#), is still elevated above baseline. These pathogens typically cause mild illness, like the common cold.
- Laboratory detections of [Mycoplasma pneumoniae](#) have picked up. This respiratory illness is typically mild (sometimes called “walking pneumonia”), but occasionally can cause more severe symptoms that require antibiotic treatment. You can read more about [Mycoplasma pneumoniae](#) [here](#).

Recommendations

- CDC's [core recommendations](#) for *individuals* include staying up to date with all recommended respiratory virus vaccines, practicing good respiratory hygiene (covering your cough, washing your hands), taking steps for cleaner air, and using precautions to prevent the spread of respiratory viruses when you are sick. This means staying home until you've been fever-free for 24 hours and your symptoms are getting better. CDC also recommends individuals are familiar with treatment options for flu and COVID-19, especially if you are at [high risk](#) for severe outcomes.
- CDC's [core recommendations](#) for *organizations* include supporting vaccination efforts (like hosting a clinic or providing time off for vaccination and recovery), encouraging good respiratory hygiene with posters and adequate hand-washing supplies, taking steps for cleaner air, and supporting time off for individuals to stay home when sick or to seek treatment.
- If you haven't already made a plan to [get vaccinated](#), now is the time. It can take a few weeks for protection to build after receiving a vaccine. Get protected before the holiday season begins.



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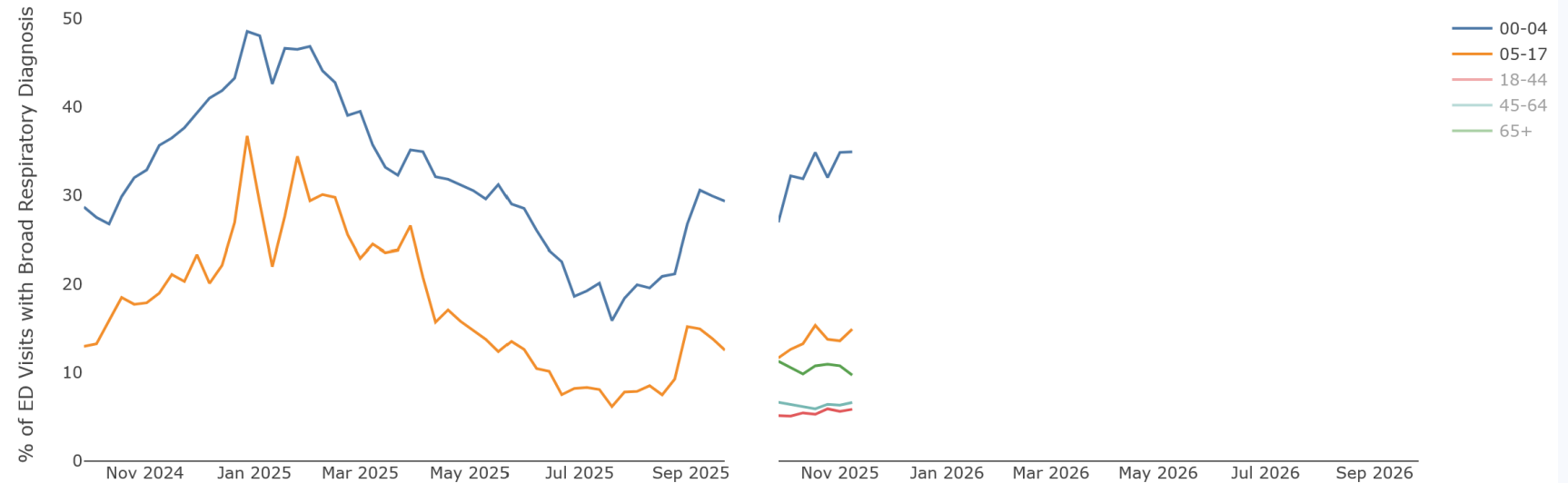

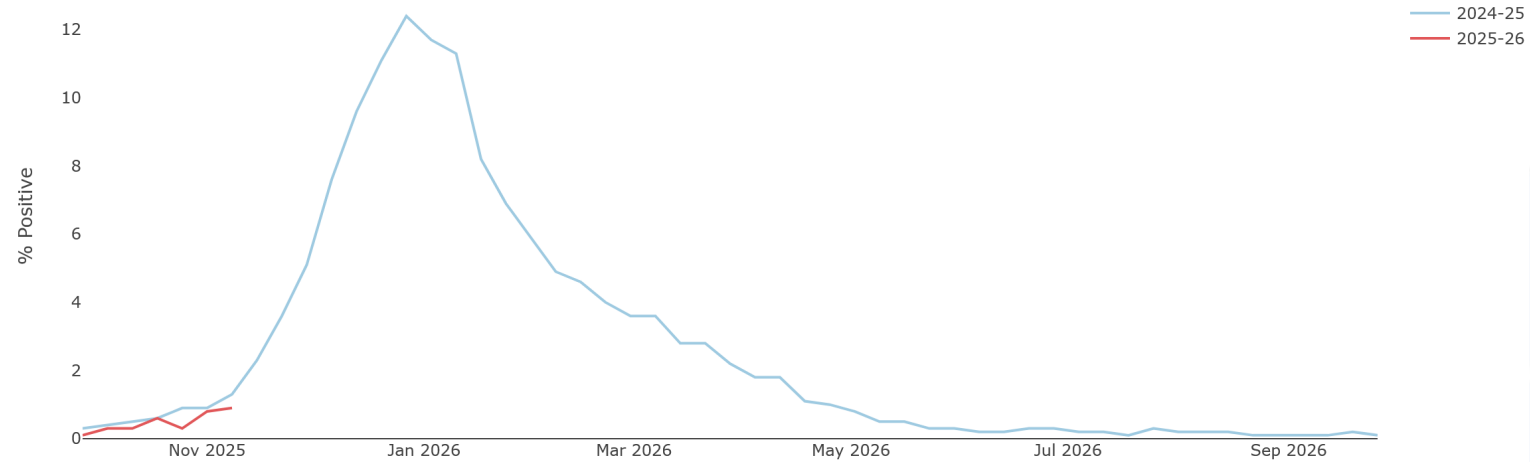

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Respiratory Dashboard – Wastewater Data

Cook County Wastewater

Includes samples collected through the Illinois Wastewater Surveillance System (IWSS) from seven Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago wastewater treatment plants. Raw viral concentrations are normalized by flow rate to get viral copies per liter of wastewater then aggregated to get a county-wide sum. 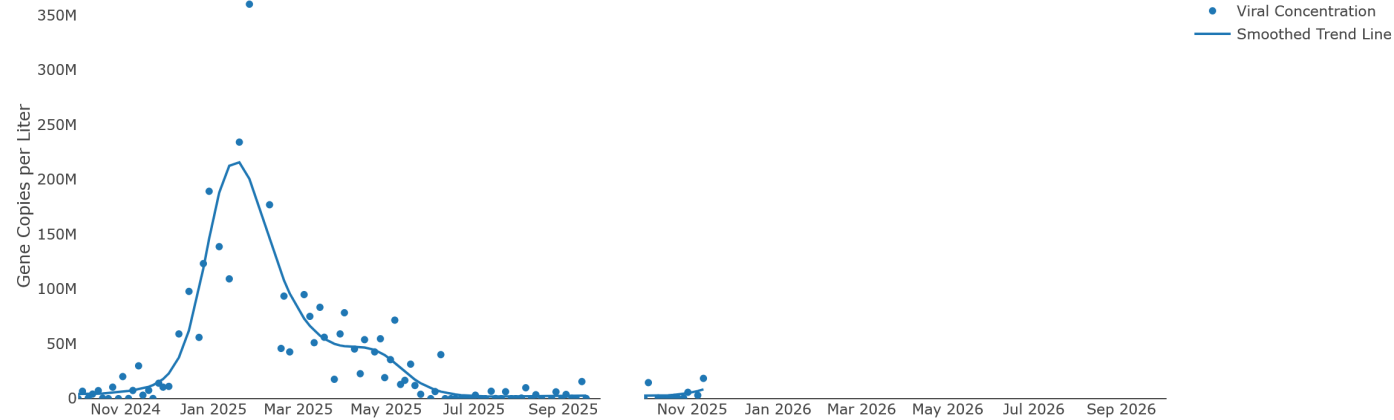

Aggregated Cook County Influenza A Viral Concentrations



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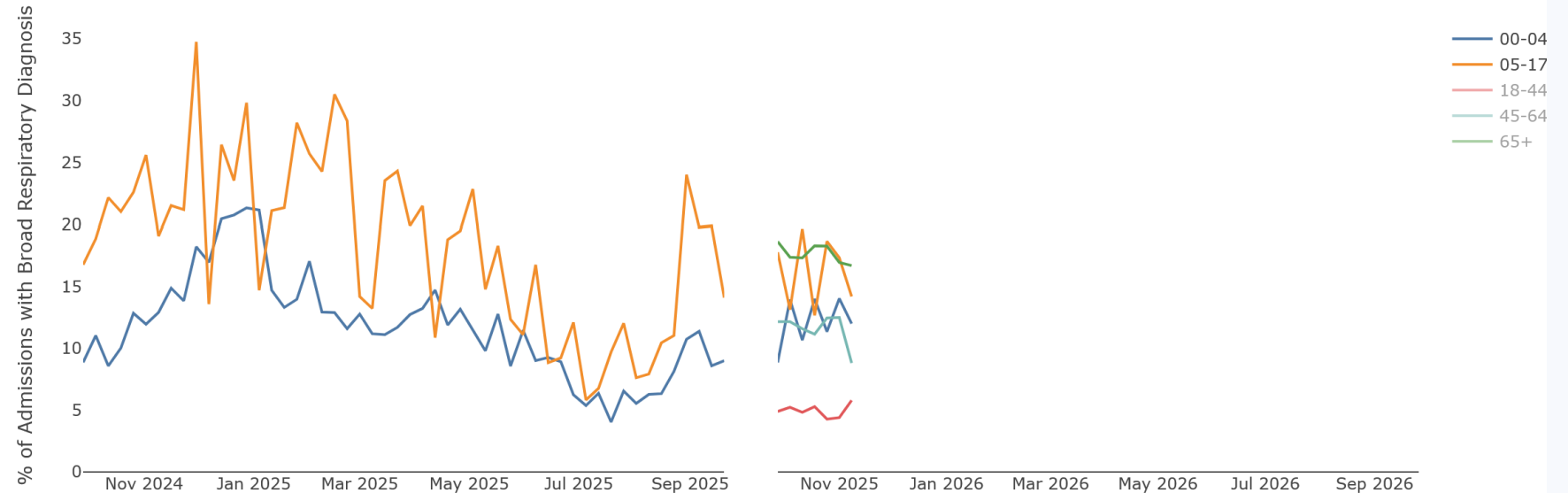

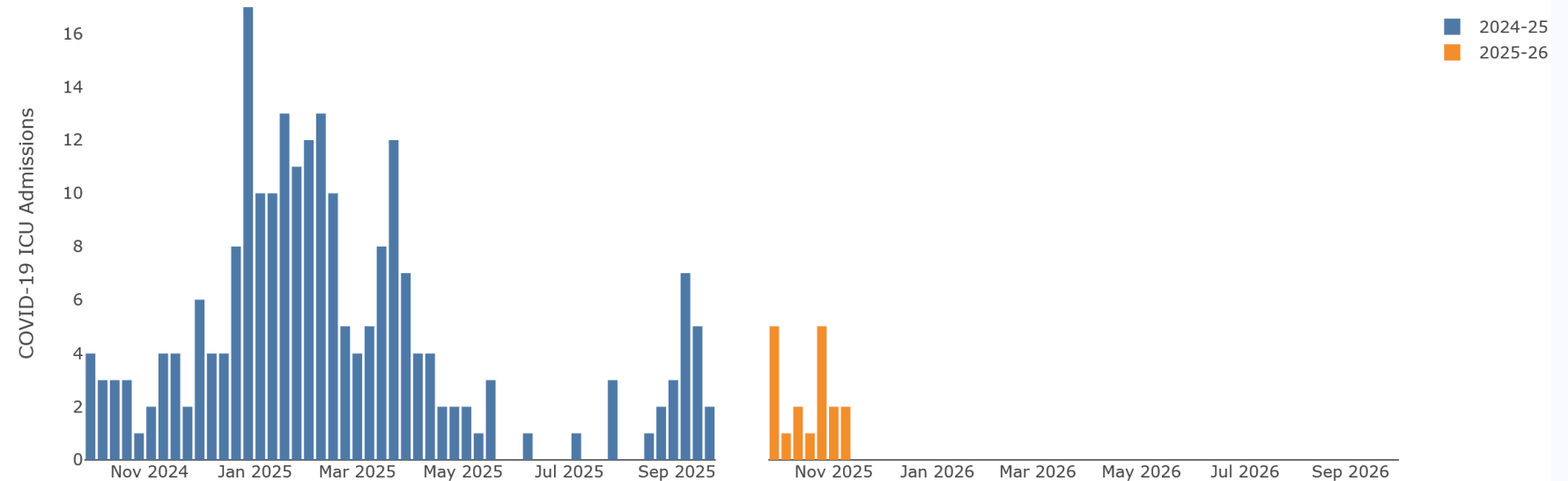

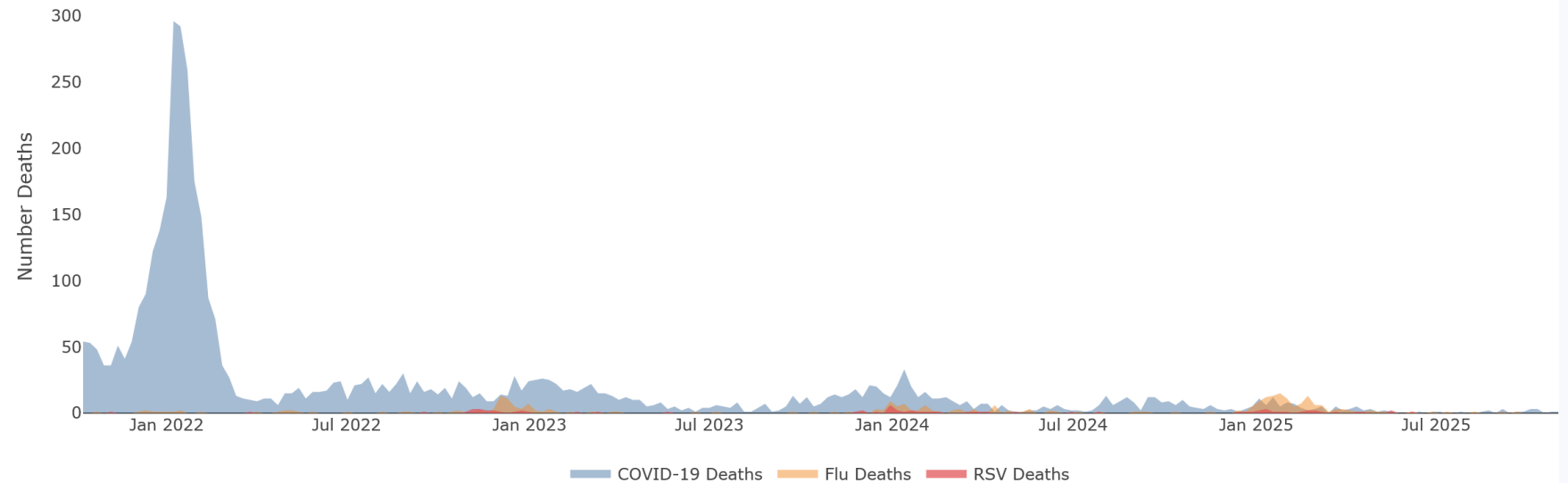

COVID-19, Flu, and RSV Death Counts

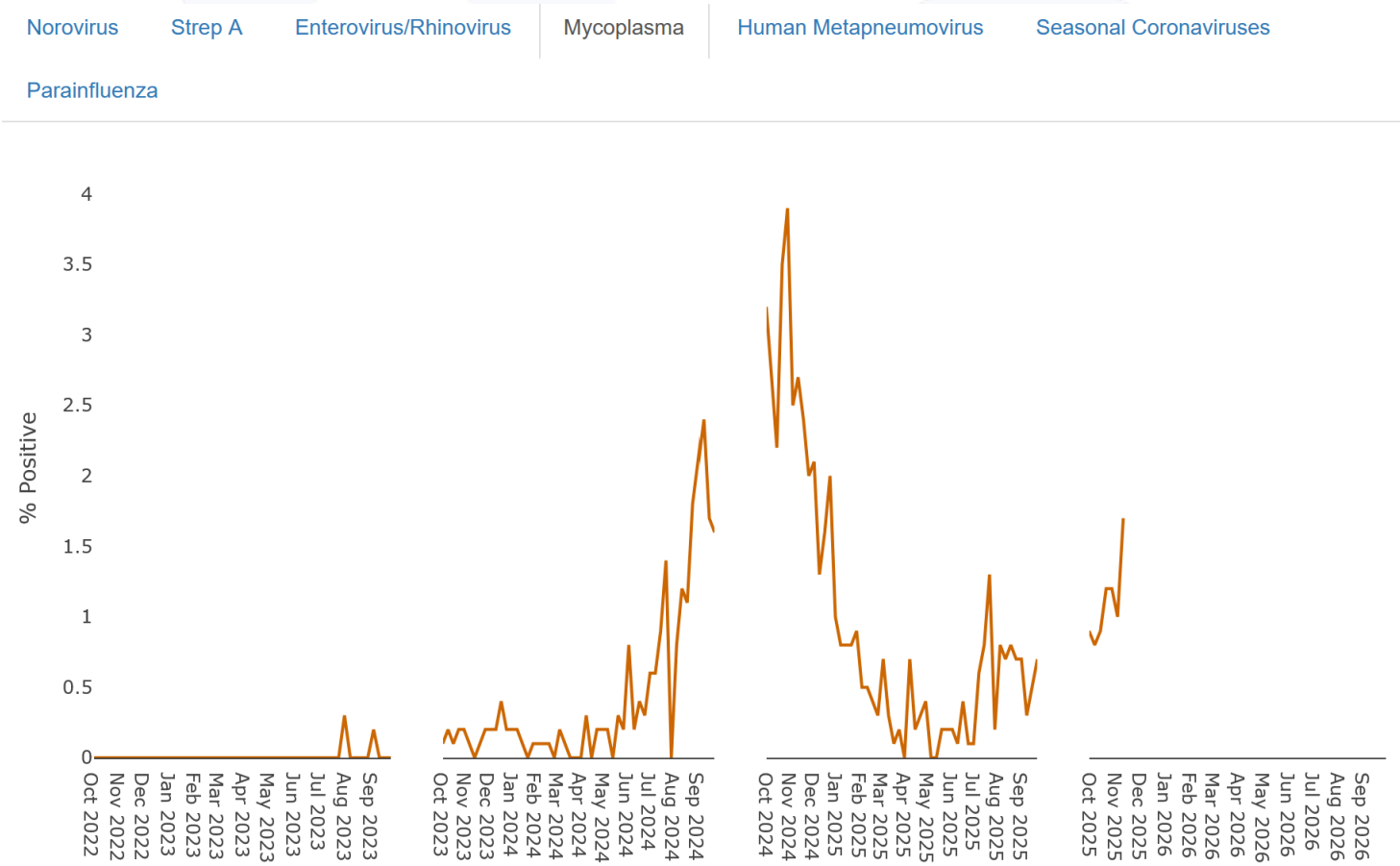
Flu mortality surveillance has traditionally included deaths due to pneumonia because these diseases are highly related and, previously, influenza deaths were often coded as pneumonia deaths. However, since the COVID-19 pandemic, many pneumonia deaths are now caused by COVID-19. The number of deaths with certificates including flu and the number of deaths with certificates including COVID-19 are displayed to help understand the relative contribution of each disease to PIC deaths. Although not typically included in PIC deaths, deaths associated with RSV are also included here for comparison.



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School Nurse/Public Health Collaboration – Pneumonia in Fall 2024



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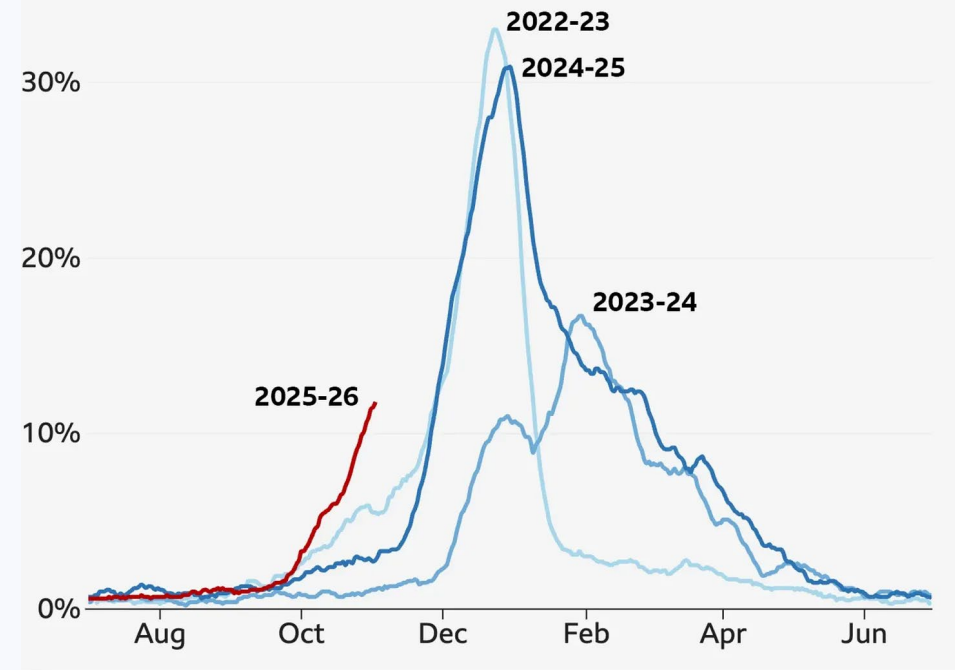
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Flu A H3N2 Subclade K

- International researchers have published data indicating an evolved strain of Influenza A may become dominant this season (early data from UK/Japan shows subclade K in 90% of samples)
- The Influenza A H3N2 virus has undergone significant antigenic drift since the selection of the strain used in this season's flu shot
- Good news - preliminary data from the UK suggests that the vaccine for the current season is 70-75% effective at preventing hospitalization in 2-17 year olds

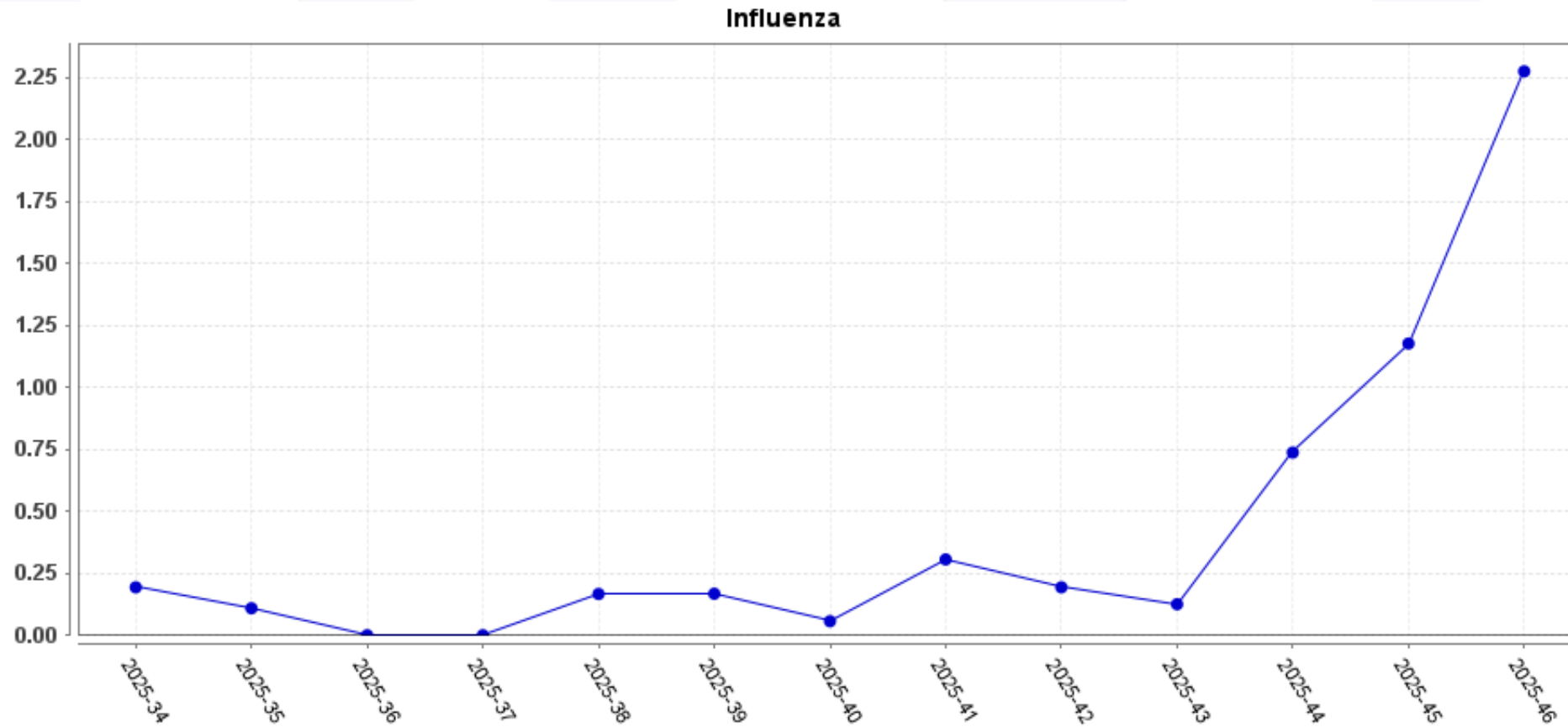

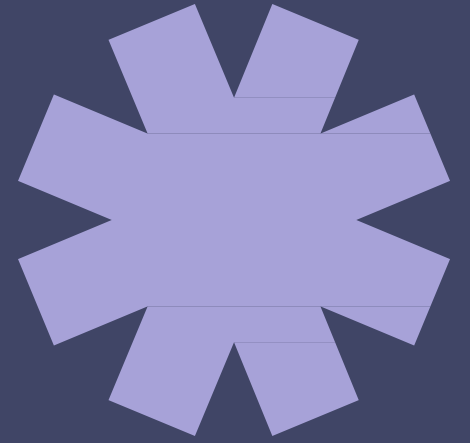
